NEW DIRECTORY BOARD TO ASSIST TRAFFIC MOVEMENT ON CAMPUS

For a number of years the University has seen the need for a directory board on the main entrance driveway to assist people in locating departments and buildings on the University site. Approval was granted in the last triennium for the construction of this directory board and work was about to commence when the Federal Government advised universities that uncommitted work was to be held in abeyance.

In response to representations made by the University to the Universities Commission, approval was subsequently received for the work to proceed because of the dual function of the directory board as part of the University's fire alarm system. The fire alarms in each University building will be connected to the directory board to illuminate the coloured plastic replicas of each building. Should a fire alarm occur, the particular building affected will light up on the directory board, thus assisting the fire brigade in quickly locating the building on the University This arrangement has been provided at the request the New South Wales Fire Brigade which sees it as a significant improvement in the University's fire safety arrangements. Because of the fire alarm relays and lighting housed in the board, the directory will be a more substantial struc-

users of the site during its construction.

ture than would have been necessary for the directory alone. The face of the board has been designed to provide maximum clarity for quick identification of buildings. Groups of buildings will be colour coded in relation to the major car park closest to

them to which the visitor will be directed. From this car park a series of pedestrian signs will guide him to the individual building housing the department he is seeking. The existing pedestrian signs around the University will be adjusted following the erection of the main directory board and will be colour coded in the same way as the directory itself. The names of departments will be listed alphabetically on the face of the directory board and will provide for future development and changes.

The original intention was to erect a directory board on the central median strip adjacent to the widened section of the entrance driveway. Experience has shown that this widened section of the road is unlikely to be used for the purpose originally envisaged and it is now proposed to modify the existing kerb lines near the head of the entrance driveway to create a 'layby' on the western side of the road. This will enable the directory board to be erected on the western side of the entrance driveway so that it will be equally accessible to both car drivers and pedestrians The 'layby' will also be signposted as a set-down area for taxis and other vehicles bringing passengers to the University site. It is hoped that this arrangement will avoid the tendency of taxi drivers and others, to drop passengers at the head of the driveway beneath the 'No Standing' sign effectively blocking other traffic movement in this critical area while they do so. It is proposed that the alterations to the entrance driveway and the erection of the directory board will be carried out during the May vacation, weather permitting, and every effort will be made to minimise inconvenience to




Diagram shows location of Directory Board

THE STAFF ASSOCIATION

Over the last few weeks the Executive has taken appropriate action as a whole or in various committees sometimes augmented by other Association members, on a number of matters, the major ones being: The Senate Committee's Tutors Report, Housing Loans (particularly under the University Housing Loan Scheme), Academic Promotions and Appeals, a proposed revision of Study Leave conditions, problems with Association items in University News, Industrial Registration and Membership, Allowances to Deans, Departmental Heads, etc., and staff retrenchment in view of newspaper reports of financial difficulties in some Universities.

The President attended Senate, by invitation, to speak to the Association's paper on Academic Promotions and the President and President of the Tutor's Association had been invited to Senate at time of writing to speak to a joint Staff Association/Tutors Association response to the Senate Committee's Tutor Report.

The Executive is presently forming a specialist Committee to consider in specific terms the position of staff in relation to Superannuation when the Commonwealth Superannuation Scheme is fully operat-

ive, and is in contact with FAUSA which has commissioned a full-scale independent actuarial examination of Schemes operating in all N.S.W. Universities and the relative advantages and disadvantages of moving into the Commonwealth Scheme when this becomes possible. (The FAUSA research will allow comparison with an AVCC study in connection with which the Executive had taken some initiative).

The Association's University Government Committee has considered the "White Paper" on University Government and is preparing a further submission to the Council Committee. In terms of the motion of the First Term Meeting a further poll is to be conducted and members and non-members of the Association are urged to once again respond on this question when questionnaires are received.

The Annual General Meeting of the Association will be held in the first or second week of June (4th or 1lth) and Preliminary Notices calling for motions will be issued in the near future. It is also appropriate that motions for the FAUSA Council Meeting, to be held in August (at this University), be passed through an A.G.M. Members are accordingly invited to submit motions for FAUSA with those for our own A.G.M. by the date indicated on the preliminary notice.

the century since English literature had become accepted as an academic subject the trend had been away from purely philological studies towards a situation where English was a house of many

mansions. "To my mind our first duty is to the main body of English literature and our own Australian literature and provided that this centre is solidly established, there is room for a great deal of exciting work to be done in areas such as Creative Writing, Film, and the Inter-relationships with other Literatures and Arts." Professor Burrows stressed that the 'centre' of English studies must be held - Shakespeare and Milton, Wordsworth and Jane Austen were too important to go neglected. Modern writers, and perhaps we thought first of Australian writers, could only gain from being read in such a context. The foundations for working along these lines had been firmly laid by his disting-uished predecessors, Prof-essors Gus Cross, Clive Hart, and Tony Gibbs. He was very pleased to come to an able and energetic department at an exciting stage of its development. Professor Burrows is married and has three daughters, aged

and has three daughters, aged 17, 14 and 7. His wife, who grew to in Glen Innes, was also an English teacher in Sydne, and on the North Coast.

PROFESSOR BURROWS JOINS ENGLISH

The new Head of the Department of English is 47 year old Professor John F. Burrows. He obtained his Bachelor's degree from the University of Sydney, was a school teacher in Taree and Sydney, and eventually became an Associate Professor at the University of Sydney.

Having spent most of his life circling about Newcastle - in New England, on the North Coast, and in Sydney - Professor Burrows hoped that he was ready to come to the centre of it all.

Professor Burrows obtained his MA (Hons. I) from the University of Sydney in 1965 and his PhD from the University of London in 1967.

Professor Burrows has had extensive university teaching

experience both at undergraduate and postgraduate levels in almost every aspect of post-Renaissance English Literature, including American and Australian Literature. His research has lain in two First in Australian areas. Literature, where he is known mainly for his publications on Patrick White, although he is also an authority on Shaw Neilson and on the nineteenth century Australian novelists, notably Marcus Clarke. But secondly, he is even better known for his work on Jane Austen and for his book Jane Austen's "Emma", which achieved international acclaim when published in 1968. A more recent work is Andrew Marvell and the Idea of Wit, published in 1972. Professor Burrows has played an active role in various

Professor Burrows has played an active role in various literary societies and was for some time Senior Assistant Examiner in English at the Higher School Certificate. He has been acting Editor of Southerly on two occasions. Professor Burrows said that in

AUSTRALIAN VICE-CHANCELLOR'S COMMITTEE

DISCUSSIONS WITH MINISTER FOR EDUCATION

The AVCC held discussions with the Minister for Education (Senator J.L. Carrick) on the evening of April 20, 1976.

1.1 Triennial Planning

The AVCC discussed with the Minister the need to restore the triennial system for 1977/79. The Minister indicated that both he and the Government have a commitment to triennial funding, and that he hoped it would be possible to restore it in the context of the Australian overnment's budget for 1976/ /7. The Minister accepted an offer from the AVCC to provide him with a paper on the triennial principle. Such a document has been sent to the Minister.

1.2 Tertiary Education Commission

The AVCC discussed with the Minister the possible merging of the Universities Commission and the Commission on Advanced Education into a single Tertiary Education Commission, and emphasized the desirability of any legislation preserving the special position and role of the universities.

1.3 Student Assistance

The AVCC told the Minister that increases in TEAS allowances and Commonwealth Postgraduate Award stipends should be given the highest priority in the 1976/77 budet, and that they should be aintained at realistic levels based on movements in appropriate indexes. Further, it requested financial support for loans schemes to supplement TEAS.

1.4 University Research

The AVCC raised with the Minister the question of university research, including research dependent upon the interest and support of Australian Government agencies not responsible to the Minister, for example, the ARGC and the NH and MRC.

DISCUSSIONS WITH MINISTER FOR SCIENCE

The Chairman, AVCC (Professor Derham), held discussions with the Minister for Science (Senator J.J. Webster) on 19 March, 1976.

2.1 ARGC Funding

Senator Webster has given an assurance that universities will receive full reimbursement in July this year of the bridging finance that they provided to cover the shortfall in funds available for ARGC purposes during the first half of 1976. Professor Derham also discussed with the Minister the possibility of indexing ARGC grants in some way. The AVCC is convening a conference of appropriate university representatives, under the Chairmanship of Professor G.M. Badger, to prepare a doc-ument on the philosophy of university research. If approved by the AVCC, this document will be forwarded to the Minister to assist him when discussing the funding of research in 1976/77 and later years.

2.2 Science Policy and ASTEC

Professor Derham discussed with the Minister the development of a science policy and the role and future of ASTEC.

3. REPORTS ON POST-SECONDARY EDUCATION IN TASMANIA AND WESTERN AUSTRALIA

The AVCC has noted the reports of the inquiries into post-secondary education in Tasmania and Western Australia and that a similar inquiry has been foreshadowed in South Australia. It has written to the Minister for Education in Western Australia offering advice about any legislation to give effect to the central recommendation in the report affecting that State, namely, the establishment of a Post-Secondary Education Commission.

4. ACADEMIC SALARIES

The AVCC has noted the Determination and Report, February, 1976 of the Academic Salaries Tribunal which was made in response to written submissions from FAUSA, FSAACAE and the AVCC, seeking interim increases in academic salaries. The AVCC regrets the Tribunal's decision that there should not be any immediate adjustment to academic salaries, apart from those which flow from National Wage Case decisions. It is awaiting the outcome of the wideranging review being undertaken by the Tribunal.

5. SUPERANNUATION

All universities have authorised the AVCC to negotiate on their behalf to have them classified as "approved authorities" for the purposes of the new superannuation scheme for Commonwealth Government

employees. The AVCC has approached the Minister for Education on this matter, who has taken it up with the Treasurer. It has been made clear to the Minister that if universities are declared "approved authorities" it will be the responsibility of each university to negotiate actual terms of entry for its staff members. Now that details of the proposed new Government scheme are available, the AVCC is in a position to press its negotiations with the Government through the Universities Commission and the Treasury.

6. MUSEUMS REPORT

The AVCC is examining the Report of the Committee of Inquiry on Museums and National Collections including the Report of the Planning Committee on the Gallery on Aboriginal Australia, entitled "Museums in Australia 1975", which contains a chapter and recommendations on university museums. It will consider what comments, if any, it should make on the Report and suggests that individual universities will wish to make their own comments.

7. OECD REVIEW OF AUSTRALIAN EDUCATION

The AVCC appointed a Sub-committee to prepare a submission in connection with the OECD Review of Australian Education on the theme "The transition from school to work or further study". That submission has been forwarded to the Department of Education.

8. NEAT

The AVCC has under consideration the recently announced reductions in the allowances payable under the NEAT scheme which are causing financial hardship to some students.

9. STUDY OF STUDENT PROGRESS

The Department of Education has agreed to a request from the AVCC to undertake a survey of student progress similar to the 1961 Study, involving both universities and colleges of advanced education, and based probably on new entrants in 1971.

10. MEETING WITH FAUSA

AVCC representatives will meet FAUSA representatives on 17 June, 1976.

All three are currently postgraduate research students in the Department of Mathematics and recipients of Australian Government Postgraduate Awards.

In addition, Mr Cummings is a recent Gowrie Scholarship recipient, while Miss Kennedy and Mrs Heinrich were recently awarded Jamieson Prizes of \$50 each. There were only five Jamieson Prizes awarded in the state of New South Wales of which four were awarded at this University. The awards to Miss Kennedy and Mrs Heinrich were on the basis of outstanding performance in a field of science.

TRIP BRINGS TWO AWARDS

Xavier Herbert came South from his native Queensland on April 22 to receive two awards for his contributions to Australian literature.

One, conferred on him at the Arts Conferring of Degrees Ceremony held in the Great Hall of the University the next day, was from the University.

In the words of the Vice-Chancellor, who gave the Occasional Address at the Ceremony, the author from Cairnes "joined the select and distinguished list of

those on whom the University has conferred its highest accolade in the field or Arts and Literature, namely the Degree of Doctor of Letters, Honoris Causa".

Xavier Herbert was the recipient of the second Award in Sydney three days later. His mammoth novel, Poor Fellow My Country, earned for him the 1975 Miles Franklin Award. Xavier and Miles Franklin, a female novelist who died in 1957, were close friends. Winners of the Award in the past 10 years include Patrick White, George Johnston, Ronald McKie, Thea Astley and Thomas Keneally.

CONVOCATION'S ANNUAL MEETING

However, Senator Peter Baume (N.S.W.) has agreed to address the Society in his place and this meeting is scheduled for June 22.

It is anticipated that Senator Baume will look at the question of the appropriate level of government welfare spending in the light of national economic management and the expectations of the community.

DEEP RESPECT FOR UNIVERSITIES COMMISSION

rofessor E.O. Hall, Professor of Metallurgy, has returned to the University after 16 months' secondment to the Universities Commission, Canberra.

Professor Hall was initially closely involved with the development of science policy within the Commission, which led to the concept of encouraging "special post-graduate centres" proposed for the 1976-78 triennium.

He stated that ne was still of the opinion that these proposals, embodied in the Commission's Sixth Report, would be a major advance in rationalizing the very fragmented approach to research which has been the pattern in Australia in the past. Professor Hall stated that it was disappointing to him that the previous government found itself unable to accept the recommendations of the Commission's report, since this was the first time that such an event had arisen since the Universities Commission was established in 1959. "The political events of late 1975, and the budget deficit which the new government had to face, has caused it to look on 1976 as a year outside the normal triennium pattern. The recommendations for the period 1977-79 will now not be known until after the budget is brought down in August," he said. In addition Professor Hall was Convenor of working par-ties for the Commission on Clinical Pharmacology and on Rehabilitation Medicine, and he took a keen interest in the application of computers

to Library Resources throughout Australia.

He described his time at the Commission as a fascinating and very instructive period. He had come away with a deep respect for the work of both the Commissioners and the Secretariat for the Commission.

RAILWAY TRAVEL CONCESSIONS

Identification cards, which are valid for one year from April 1, 1976 to March 31, 1977. Cards are available to fulltime students of the University who are not engaged in business or in employment, and are intended to be retained in the student's possession for the period of validity. Holders will be entitled to half fare concession rates for rail travel interstate and within New South Wales, except for journeys of less than 40 kilometres wholly within a suburban railways area. SPORTING NEWS

Plans are going ahead for the University's Aquatic Centre on the Hunter River at Raymond Terrace to be officially opened on June 20. It is hoped that the opening will be part of an aquatic day and that one of the special activities will be a rowing con-test between the Faculties of the University. Facilities for canoeing, water skiing, sailing and rowing will become available to students and members of staff of the University when the Centre is opened. Alterations have been made at the Centre, including the construction of a kitchen on the first floor and improvements to the boat ramp. A portable barbecue is also available. The Amenities Officer is carrying out investigations into the purchase of a power boat and water skis estimated to cost approximately \$7,000. The boat will be used by the newly formed Water Ski Club, which is functioning with the assistance of NUDES, and by members of staff and students at the Aquatic Centre. The University Rowing Club, which has a membership of more than 20, will operate at Raymond Terrace. The Centre will be made available to Clubs, Societies, Departments and Faculties of the University for recreation and social functions. * * * * * * * *

The University Council has approved the Sports Union's and Sporting Facilities Comm-ittee's plan to construct the courts. The two bodies are prepared to provide funds of the order of \$50,000 for the project. The plans provide for, along with the new courts, the con-struction of a new office/
