HALL OF RESIDENCE TO OPEN THIS YEAR

The Vice-Chancellor said that the university's first Hall of Residence was scheduled to be completed in two stages this year. The university expects one residential block and a dining hall to be ready for use in June and a second residential building to be completed in September.

Students and members of staff wanting to live in the residential college can obtain application forms from The Warden. First Hall of Residence, University of Newcastle. 2308

The university has decided to make the college available to members of the public in university vacations, and is also inviting enquiries from private organisations which require accommodation for conferences and similar functions.

When work was started last April the target completion date was March this year, but progress has been interrupted by strikes and bad weather.

The college's residential population will consist of undergraduate and post-graduate students, sub-wardens (tutors) and university staff members. Accommodation for 111 residents should become available in June with the completion of one building, and completion of the other block around September will augment the number of places to 183.

The University Council has fixed a weekly residential fee during term of \$24 for undergraduates. For his \$24 an undergraduate will get a single bed-study room (with a desk, chair, easy chair, bed, wardrobe and bookshelves) 16 meals a week, bed linen and cleaning and laundering services. Flats are to be provided for single and married sub-wardens.

Residents of the Hall will eat in a communal dining hall and on every floor of the residential blocks there will be bathrooms, tearooms, laundries, drying rooms, a common room and a tutorial room. Six sub-wardens will be appointed this year to provide academic assistance to residents.

Second Term 1972 will begin on 4th June and terminate on 12th August; Third Term will start on 3rd September and end 24 hours after an individual's last university examination. The second term residential fee for undergraduates will be \$240 and the third term fee \$264. As regards vacations, the fees will be calculated on a daily basis, undergraduates paying \$3.30 per day, which includes breakfast and dinner.

During the construction period the Hall of Residence is being controlled by an Interim Board of Trustees, with the University's Vice-Principal, Professor Newton-John, as Chairman. This body is expected to be succeeded by a Board of Trustees later this year.

The Hall is administered by the Warden, Dr. M. Blackmore, who, at 28, is probably the youngest college principal in Australia. A Northern Irishman, Dr. Blackmore is a Senior Lecturer in Chemistry and was on the academic staff at La Trobe University when he took on duties at that University's Menzies College. He will

divide his time between the Hall of Residence and the Department of Chemistry in the University of Newcastle.

### A C A D E M I C A P P O I N T M E N T S

Professor H. Melvin Lieberstein has taken up his appointment to the second Chair of Mathematics at the University.

Professor Lieberstein is a Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science (Mathematics) in the University of Arkansas, a Master of Arts (Mathematics) at the University of Kansas and a Ph.D. at the University of Maryland. Before joining the university he was Research Professor of Mathematics in Wichita State University, Kansas.

He said he and his wife, Mary-anne, were animal buffs and had owned a 40-acre ranch in Kansas where they kept horses, cattle, llamas, monkeys and even an iguana as pets. As for his decision to seek an academic appointment in Australia, he said the quality of social life in the United States of America was degenerating and he and his wife were convinced that the Australian situation would be better. The quality of academic life was also going downhill in the States and the turmoil at universities there that had been made public was only the tip of the iceberg.

Apart from the social advantages he envisaged from living in Newcastle, he had been drawn by the prospectus for the Faculty of Mathematics which was extremely appealing to an academic with his research interests. The type of mathematics programme which the Faculty envisaged would foster cooperation between people interested in a number of fields. In his early academic career one of his interests had been high speed aerodynamics and problems associated with space vehicles reentering the atmosphere. He was interested in animal physiology, having intensively examined blood flow and electro-physiology. He was also interested in the physiology of the kidneys and was very pleased to arrive at the University of Newcastle at a time when the teaching of the Biological Sciences was being introduced.

Dr. J.L. Seggie, a former student of this university, has taken up his appointment as Lecturer in Psychology. Dr. Seggie was a Senior Psychologist with the Department of Army from July, 1969 to July, 1970, a Senior Lecturer in the Mitchell College of Advanced Education from August, 1970, until January, 1971, and a Lecturer in the University of New England during 1971. Awarded a University Medal when he graduated as a Bachelor of Arts in 1968, he will be admitted to the Degree of Doctor of Philosophy at the next graduation ceremony.

Mr. P.J. Moylan has begun duties as Lecturer in Electrical Engineering, Mr. Moylan holds the degrees of Bachelor of Engineering with Honours in the University of Melbourne and Master of Engineering in the University of Newcastle.

Dr. R.A. Fredlein has arrived at the university to assume duties as Lecturer in Chemistry. Dr. Fredlein was a Post-doctoral Research Fellow at the Electrochemistry Laboratory, University of Pennsylvania, from 1968 until 1971. He is a B.Sc., and a Ph.D. in the University of Queensland.

## RESIGNATION

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Mr. L.E. Mankowski, Lecturer in Architecture, has submitted his resignation (effective 28th February).

### PROFESSOR RITCHIE ABSENT UNTIL MAY

The Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Head of the Department of Philosophy, Professor A.M. Ritchie, is in the United States of America on oversea study leave. His itinerary includes visits to the University of Texas, where he will work with postgraduate students on Cartesian Philosophy, and universities on the East Coast. Professor Ritchie expects to return to Australia in May.

Professor K.R. Dutton, Head of the Department of French, is serving as Acting Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Dr. W. Doneila is Acting Head of the Department of Philosophy.

### HIGHER DEGREES APPROVED

The University Council has admitted Frank Thomas Bagnall (Department of Physics) to the Degree of Doctor of Philosophy, Terence Joseph Ryan (Department of Classics), Enid May Banks (Department of Psychology) and James Douglas Moody (Department of History) to the Degrees of Master of Arts and William John Preston (Department of Chemical Engineering) to the Degree of Master of Engineering. The degrees will be conferred at the next graduation ceremony.

The candidates' theses are entitled: Frank Bagnall, "A Contribution to Pcl Propogation Concepts"; Terence Ryan, "Concept Analysis and Character Study in the Opera Historica of the Venerable Bede, with particular reference to his account of early Papal-policy in Britain"; Enid Banks, "Dyslexia: a problem of serial order"; James Moody, "The Development of the Newspaper Press in Newcastle (1855 - 1880)"; William Preston, "Studies on the transport of solids in near-horizontal fluidised beds".

### CONSIDERATION OF SECOND CHAIRS

The University Council has appointed Selection Committees to make recommendations on the appointment of second Chairs in Psychology, Commerce and Education.

### PROFESSOR ROBINSON'S APPOINTMENT

The Council appointed *Professor K.W. Robinson* Head of the Department of Geography for two years beginning on 1st January. The Council was informed that the former head, *Professor A.D. Tweedie*, planned to take sabbatical leave this year and had requested that Professor Robinson be appointed.

### GRADUATE APPOINTED PROFESSOR

Dr. G.C. Jones, a student of the former Newcastle University College who holds the degree of Bachelor of Arts in the University of N.S.W. with first class honours, has been appointed Professor of French and Head of the Department of Romance Languages in the University of New England.

Dr. Jones is a Master of Arts in the University of Melbourne and a Doctor of the University of Grenoble, France. Before receiving his appointment to the University of New England, he was Lecturer in the University of Newcastle (June, 1966 to December, 1967) and Senior Lecturer in the University of Western Australia.

### LECTURERS FOR ADULT CLASSES

Members of the University's Staff are included in the lecturers selected by the University of Sydney and the Workers' Educational Association for their classes in first term this year. The classes are staged to promote adult education.

Dr. R.S. Boesen and Mrs. L.N. Morris, of the Department of Geology, will conduct "An Introduction to Geology" in Room LG03 of the Geology Building beginning on 6th March. Mr. N. Hanley, postgraduate student in English, will be lecturer for a "Survey of the Poets - from Shakespeare to the 'Beat' Poets" in the W.E.A. Centre from 2nd March. A course entitled "Human Relations" will be conducted by Mr. R.McL. Robinson, of the Department of Philosophy, at the W.E.A. Centre beginning on 1st March. Dr. D.W. Dockrill, of the Department of Philosophy, will be responsible for a course on "Minds and Machines" to be held at the W.E.A. Centre from 31st May.

Most of the remaining University of Sydney - W.E.A. classes for this year will be taken by the University of Sydney's staff in Newcastle - Mr. J.W. Turner ("Citizens of Newcastle", a local history course) and Mr. J.M. Pullen ("Introduction to Economics", "The Historic Buildings of Newcastle" and "The New Left").

### JAPANESE INTEREST IN POLLUTION SERVICE

The University has been informed that the air pollution measuring project which it and NBN Channel 3 intend to set in motion shortly has been reported in newspapers in Japan, where problems of the environment are carefully heeded.

The Captain of the S.S. Iron Whyndham, Captain I.F. Wright, of Cardiff, wrote from Kobe, Japan, enclosing a cutting from the "Mainichi Daily News" of 10th January. The cutting is a four-column story, with a picture, announcing that the university and NBN Channel 3 had combined to help overcome air pollution in Newcastle by establishing a mobile service to obtain data on pollutants at a number of locations. Captain Wright said a similar article had appeared in another Japanese newspaper.

NBN Channel 3 donated a motor vehicle and measuring equipment and will communicate information on the amount of carbon monoxide, sulphur dioxide and dust in the air to members of the public. In return the University will provide staff to operate the mobile unit, which is believed to be the only testing station in Australia that can be moved to several sites for spot checks.

BRIDGING-REFRESHER COURSE IN MATHEMATICS 14TH - 25TH FEBRUARY, 1972

The University of Newcastle Research Associates will conduct its third annual evening Bridging-Refresher course in Mathematics during the last two weeks of February. Lectures and tutorials will be held at the University on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays of these two weeks from 6 to 8 p.m.

Whilst the course is open to all prospective Mathematics I students, it is primarily intended for those who matriculated some years ago and those who only studied Higher School Certificate Mathematics at the second level (short course) or at the third level in 1971. The course will contain basic Calculus and Algebra

Every student wishing to enrol in the course should obtain and complete an enrolment form from the Mathematics office and take it, together with the enrolment fee of \$8, to Mr. M.J. Hayes, Department of Mathematics, on Monday, 14th February, between 2 and 5.30 p.m.

### BACHELOR OF MATHEMATICS DEGREE

The Dean of the Faculty of Mathematics (Professor R.G. Keats) said some students holding Teachers' College scholarships had been in doubt as to whether the Bachelor of Mathematics degree at the University was a course recognised by the Department of Education for the purpose of these Scholarships.

The following is a text of a letter from the Department of Education:

"This is to confirm that a teacher with a Bachelor of Mathematics from the University of Newcastle together with a recognised course of Teacher Training will qualify for Teachers' Certificate Attainments Four Years Trained".

Professor Keats said he understood that the Bachelor of Mathematics degree at the University was inadvertently omitted from the 1972 handbook issued by the Department of Education and would be included in future handbooks.

#### BRITISH SUMMER SCHOOLS

Information about the Summer Schools to be conducted at Oxford, Stratford-upon-Avon, London and Edinburgh by certain British Universities in July and August, 1972, is available in a booklet held by Mr. J.W. Armstrong, Secretary's Division. The booklet has been published by the British Council.

### AWARDS FOR COMMONWEALTH UNIVERSITY STAFF

The Association of Commonwealth Universities has published a handbook giving details of fellowships, visiting professorships, grants, etc., open to university staff in a Commonwealth country who wish to carry out research, make study visits or teach for a while at a University in another Commonwealth country.
