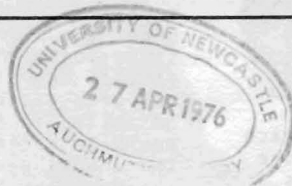

HONORARY DEGREE FOR NOVELIST

The University will honour the Australian novelist, Xavier Herbert, at the Arts Conferring of Degrees Ceremony in the Great Hall of the University at 2.30 p.m. on Friday, April 23.

Xavier Herbert, whose mammoth book "Poor Fellow My Country" was released last year, will receive an Honorary Degree of Doctor of Letters in recognition of his contribution to creative writing in Australia. He will be the first novelist to be honoured by the University in this way.

He will receive his Honorary Degree from the Chancellor (Sir Alister McMullin), to whom he will be presented by the Dean of the Faculty of Arts (Professor K.W. Robinson). In the official tribute, Professor Robinson describes Xavier Herbert as a major force in Australian literature and also an anthropologist and social historian. Perhaps the most pervasive attribute of his work is his uncompromising adherence to the truth as he sees it, Professor Robinson adds.

Students graduating in the Faculty of Arts will receive their degrees at the ceremony. The Vice-Chancellor will deliver the Occasional Address. On the afternoon of April 22 degrees will be conferred on students graduating in the Faculties of Economics and Commerce and Science. Mr Justice Kirby, Chairman of the Law Reform Commission, will give the Occasional Address. Degrees in the Faculties of Architecture, Engineering and Mathematics will be conferred in the morning of April 23 beginning at 10.30. Dr Lloyd Rees, painter, will deliver the Occasional Address. About 700 graduands of the University will receive their degrees in the three ceremonies.

Xavier Herbert, who was Writer-in-Residence in the University last year, is presently Writer-in-Residence at the University of Queensland. He will bring his wife Sadie with him to Newcastle. The decision that lectures should not be cancelled on the Graduation days is expected to result in an

unusual flow of traffic and parking problems on these days.

To accommodate visitors, the lower portion of No. 1 car park will be closed to normal University parking on April 22 and 23.



"Nucellous"

One of the University's recent art acquisitions is a bronze sculpture by Newcastle Artist, Marilyn McGrath. The work was purchased from the University's art acquisition fund and was one of 10 sculptures exhibited by the Artist at the Bonython Gallery in Sydney in September last year. The work is called 'Nucellous' and is an abstract interpretation of growth from a single cell.

The sculpture has been erected on a concrete pedestal in the garden area adjacent to the paving leading to the main entrance of the Great Hall. Some plant material had to be removed to enable the construction of the pedestal and this will be shortly replaced to provide a complete contrast to the bronze sculpture itself.

Marilyn McGrath was born in Sydney and studied Sculpture with Lyndon Dadswell before furthering her studies in Japan. Marilyn is now a full-time sculptor and is assisting part-time in the University's Department of Architecture. Some of her work was exhibited in the National Arts School Teachers Exhibition, Newcastle, in 1972, the Von Bertouch Gallery, Newcastle, and the C.B.A. Sydney in 1973. In addition to this University, works from her most recent exhibition have been purchased by private collectors and one by the Art Gallery of New South Wales.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR THE UNION

Dear Sir,

It seems a sad fact of this University's development over the past 15 years that the more newer courses offered the less chance there is to acquire some awareness of what is being offered in each of them. In 1960 there were not only fewer departments, but also fewer fields of study within each of them. In 1960 it was possible to have some acquaintance with the range of disciplines available apart from one's own studies; today it is impossible.

This is of course a problem for the student contemplating possible subject choices or options. It also means that every member of the academic community has a very imperfect knowledge of what the University is doing. There is something very wrong with the idea of going through three or more years of University life with a working knowledge of what is taught in only several departments out of 26, and a total ignorance of what is being studied in all the others!

As a suggestion proffered for debate, it seems to me that a member of the academic staff from any interested department should be enabled to offer annually a University-wide lecture for students not enrolled in his own course. Each such lecture could aim to be a sort of encapsulated overview of present directions in the discipline concerned, made as entertaining and informative as possible, perhaps by the use of slides or film. The cynics will say that no one would even bother to attend. I wonder whether that is true.

BY-ELECTION - STUDENT MEMBER OF COUNCIL

SUBMISSIONS ON UNIVERSITY GOVERNMENT

A seminar in the Drama Theatre on April 7 considered the "white paper" issued by the Committee set up to review University Government. The Convenor of the Committee (Mr W.G. Derkenne) presided and members of the Committee, members of the university and members of campus bodies spoke on the "paper". The Committee has decided to extend the closing date for the submission of views on its recommended changes in the system of government to June 30.

Senate will consider the proposals at a special meeting on Wednesday, June 9. The Faculty of Arts included consideration of the "white paper" in the agenda of its April 21 meeting and the Faculty of Education has arranged for a similar discussion on June 11 if members make submissions.

Nineteen seventy-five/seventy-six had been a year of review for Newcastle Committee of the Economic Society, the Past President (Mr F.C. Hawkins) stated on April 13. The Committee had appointed sub-Committees to consider membership, its programme and special activities.

"The 1976 programme bears testament to the work of the sub-Committee on programmes, whilst the group studying special activities is considering the possibility of holding some meetings in the Maitland area".

Mr Hawkins, who was giving his report at the Committee's annual general meeting, said the Economic Society's prize for the best honours graduate in Economics in 1976 was awarded to Mr Peter Werner Wollinski.

After two years in office Mr Hawkins did not stand for re-election.

He then spent two years as a full-time student at McGill University which awarded him an MBA degree. Before returning to Australia Fred was attached to BP Oil Canada as a Sales Supervisor. Fred and Carol met when they were enrolled in post-graduate courses at McGill.

Robert and Lucy Page met when they were students together at the University of Liverpool. Robert holds a BA degree (Liverpool) and an MA degree (Leeds). At Liverpool he became closely associated with student drama activities. He produced plays, originated the Blackpool Modern Drama Group, worked as a Drama Critic and wrote a three-act play "Armageddon".

SLANDEROUS VIEW OF "HAMLET"

The recently-established professional theatre company, the Hunter Valley Theatre Company, will use the University's Arts/Drama Theatre as its main venue for stage productions.

With its inaugural production ("The Floating World") over, the Company's second season is scheduled to open on April 23. The play will be "Hamlet on Ice", which explains all that was rotten in the state of Denmark, in a couple of hours of outrageous hilarity, bawdy debunking, song, dance, and constant surprises. It is Australia's first pantomime for adults.

"Hamlet on Ice" was written by Michael Boddy ("The Legend of King O'Malley", newspaper cook, actor and writer), Ron Blair ("The Christian Brother", "Flash Jim Vaux", "President Wilson in Paris"), and television writer Marcus Cooney, with music by Grahame Bond and Rory O'Donoghue (the "Aunty Jack" pair).

Since its first season at Sydney's Nimrod, the play has been performed in Melbourne, Perth, and Brisbane and has just completed a second six-month Sydney run at the Bondi Pavilion.

The HVTC season will run in the Drama Theatre from April 23 to May 8 and then tour. It will be directed by Terence Clarke and designed by John Page. The cast is the same as for "The Floating World": Kerry Walker (Hamlet); Michael Rolfe (Buttons); Robert Alexander (Dame Gertrude); Alex Kovacs (Horatio) and Tony Sheldon and Harry Scott (the Crantz Bros) will escort you through the rottenness.

ACCOMMODATION

Members of the university (staff and students) have the opportunity to stay in Mulubimba Lodge in Perisher Valley in the Snowy Mountains.

The lodge is owned by Shortland Alpine Club Cooperative Ltd, which includes a number of members of staff.

Completed just before Easter, the Lodge offers good accommodation in rooms with bunks and a loft with bunks for children.

The school holiday weeks during winter have been virtually booked out by members of the Club, but non-members can book accommodation in the Lodge for other periods in winter and periods in summer.

The tariff is adults, \$60 a week, \$10 a day, and children, \$30 a week, \$5 a day. The following members of staff are members of Shortland Alpine Club and will give information about how non-members can book at the Lodge: Mr A.W. Page (Civil Engineering), Mr J.W. Armstrong (Administration), Mr J.A. Lambert (Computing Centre) and Dr B. Fraser (Physics).

BANK'S SERVICES

The Commonwealth Bank on campus offers a number of services for investment-minded people.

Interest Bearing Deposits: For people who have money they can put away for a time - three, six, 12, 24 or 48 months. Interest at highest bank rates is paid six-monthly; there is no limit to the amount you can invest; interest commences from the day the money is invested.

Current interest rates: three months to less than six months, 8%; six months to less than one year, 8.25%; one year to less than two years, 8.5%; two years to less than three years, 8.75%; three years up to and including four years, 9%.
